Property Maintenance

Most homeowners take great pride in their property and make diligent efforts to maintain every aspect of their home.

The collective efforts of Mt. Healthy homeowners has a significant impact on the desirability of our community. When properties fall into disrepair, they have a negative affect on adjacent homes and contribute to lower property values.

To protect the community, City Council has adopted a code that establishes minimum property maintenance standards for property owners to adhere to.

If you see a property that looks as if it has been abandoned, has tall grass and weeds, or has other blighting issues, please report it to the Building & Zoning Division at 513-728-3185 x245 or email

wknight@mhealthy.org.

City inspector will follow up on complains within 24 business hours. Anonymous reports are accepted.

In most cases, the property owner will remedy the issue after being contacted by the City. If the property owner



does not remedy the issue in a timely manner, the City can initiate legal action that allows it to step in and address the issue. The City can then place a lien on the property to recapture these costs.

Common problems include yard overgrowth, garbage and debris, house maintenance, inoperable vehicles, improperly maintained garages/sheds/fences/swimming pools, etc.

Street Smarts

The ODOT widening of Hamilton Ave. between St. Clair and Madison will begin June 6th. Construction is projected to be finished in mid August. The widening of 13 feet will be on the east side.

A traffic study determined and City Council has approved a NO LEFT TURN sign during restricted hours at the corner of St. Clair & Hamilton Ave.
